GENERAL SUMMATION

December was highly productive as staff focused on catching up on projects and vacation. Both can be an incentive to work hard before the holidays. The upcoming holidays served as motivation to finalize work before the office quieted down in the latter half of the month. In the next few months, we will prioritize implementing the new budget tool while preparing midyear budget reports in preparation for developing the 2025/2026 fiscal year budget.

Trails Update

The Patterson Ranch Trail is now open and without restrictions. There will be a celebratory gathering in Sycamore Grove Park on January 15 for those who have been involved to gather and visit the trail if they choose although the trail is now open to the public.

HUMAN RESOURCES

Training: In December the capstone class for the LARPD Leadership Academy wrapped up. The culminating class discussed Leadership Practices. This session asked key questions such as "Why would anyone follow you as a leader?" and "What traits and characteristics do you look for in someone that you would be willing to follow?" The idea of employee engagement was explored versus the dated thinking of only considering employee retention. Thanks to consultant Todd Slingsby for enriching our learners.

An in-house training was delivered on December 5th outlining performance management policy and practice at LARPD for the supervisor group. The class discussed the difference between coaching and feedback. The learners were able to practice during case studies.

Extra Mile Award: LARPD recognizes **Natural Resources Technician Justin Emery** with the "Extra Mile" Award for his efforts in drafting maps for submission to LAFCO in response to a request for information. When called upon this high-priority project, Justin stepped up without hesitation, working under tight deadlines and evolving circumstances. The project required several rounds of detailed edits and last-minute changes, and Justin approached the challenges with professionalism and positivity. Justin applied his existing GIS knowledge and demonstrated a willingness to learn and adapt throughout the process. His final product provided LARPD with a useful tool that supports our goals and strengthens our position with key stakeholders. Justin's commitment to excellence and ability to deliver under pressure exemplifies what it means to go above and beyond. Congratulations, Justin, and thank you for your hard work and dedication!

Open Enrollment was completed, and all files and back-end work have been completed. The HR team is looking forward to another productive year as we head into recruitment season.

FINANCE

November Financials: Preliminary financial results through the month of November 2024 are as follows: Total revenues are 5% better than budget at \$4.517 million and salary and benefits expenses are 1% better than budget at \$6.183 million. Services and supplies expenses are \$333k over budget, mainly as a result of the timing of when items were budgeted vs. when the expenses were incurred. The District has not yet had any operating capital spend this fiscal year, which leaves the bottom line through the month of November at roughly \$19k better than budget.

Budgeting Tool: Finance has completed its testing on Vena's templates, workflows, and reports. Vena will be rolled out to staff in the coming weeks, and we will begin the mid-year budgeting process in mid-January. Finance will present the new system to the Board at its second meeting in January.

RFP for Audit Services: An RFP for audit services was issued on December 20th, with a due date for proposals of 5pm on January 24th. Following the due date, Finance will review the submittals and present them to the Finance Committee during its February meeting. A tentative date has been set for the board to review and accept a proposal at its March 12th meeting.

Community Outreach

Community Outreach:

The RFP for the update to the LARPD Parks, Recreation, and Trails Master Plan closed on December 10. Interview for finalists will take place on Friday, January 10, 2025. Winter/Spring Registration opened on Wednesday December 4 for LARPD's classes, programs, spring swim lessons, and spring break camps taking place between January and May 2025. LARPD also partnered with Valley Humane Society to participate in the Livermore Holiday Sights and Sounds Parade on Saturday, December 7 as part of the Livermore Ambassadog Program. The outreach team also issued a press release highlighting the return of Santa's Mailbox and the Letter's to Santa program.









The outreach team also connected the community with LARPD program offerings through email communication, social media, peach jar, and <u>www.larpd.org</u>. Throughout the month, the team sent 21,997 emails with a 63% open rate (35% industry average) between the District-Wide Newsletter, Senior Prime Time, Open Space Valley Wilds, and Senior Pop-Up Trip Emails. Across our social media accounts, 42 pieces of content were shared reaching 28.7k. Highlights included ESS holiday event highlights, Field closure notices, highlighting the Ho Ho Holiday carnival at Sycamore Grove and announcing the deadline for Letters to Santa. On <u>www.larpd.org</u>, December page views were 146,603.

Information Technology:

In December, our phone consultant, Maverick, successfully addressed a critical vulnerability in our phone system. Additionally, the team leveraged the slower end-of-year period to perform essential maintenance and firmware updates on our network switches, ensuring system reliability and security heading into the new year.

Sports & Enrichment Programs/Classes/Events

- Donuts with Santa event was more popular than ever, with a record-breaking 540 attendees this year. Participants enjoyed meeting Santa and taking family photos, engaging in games and crafts, and visiting newly added photo booth for fun and silly pictures. A highlight for children was the opportunity to adopt a stuffed pet, choosing their own special friend and receiving a handwritten adoption certificate. Adding to the festive atmosphere, the Grinch made a surprise appearance, delighting guests of all ages.
- The recreation team hosted its first-ever Sensory Santa event in December, serving 43 participants, including 12 children with intellectual or developmental disabilities (ISS). The event featured small attendance designated time slots for private Santa visits, creating a calm and welcoming environment for those with sensory sensitivities. Families expressed gratitude and excitement for being included in traditional holiday celebrations. The event also received a glowing write-up in *The Vine* online newspaper **Sensory-friendly Santa events come to town**.
- The Santa Letters project underwent a significant transformation this year, moving from handwritten, volunteer-based letters to a typed format. This shift ensured greater consistency and allowed for more personalized messages. There were over 900 personalized letters sent to children, spreading holiday joy. Special thanks to Nancy from the recreation department, who single-handedly provided this magical experience to many families.
- This year, LARPD collected an impressive 34 bins of toys and one bicycle, exceeding last year's total of 27 bins. Donations were received from local businesses and generous community members. Due to a shortage of Toys for Tots volunteers, the recreation team stepped up to deliver the final batch of donations filling a small moving truck to Alameda on the last day of the Marine Corps campaign. Thank you, Michael and Luke!

- In December, Carlie with the recreation department continued leading the preschool PE program at eight LARPD preschool classrooms each week. Each session lasted 30 minutes and included games, basic sports instruction, and physical activities. These activities provided children with a break from the classroom routines and allowed them to expend some energy in a fun and structured way. The program served a total of 110 children across eight classes. Teachers have shared positive feedback, noting that students eagerly look forward to PE time with Carlie each week. She will resume preschool PE in January after the winter break.
- With the gymnasium being closed November 25 December 24, there were extremely limited programs/classes/rentals taking place in the recreation building in December.

Open Space

Programs/Events:

- Despite the variable weather in December, Open Space continued offering a slew of programs, including several holiday themed events:
- Ranger Rudy led **Holiday Ornament program** on 12/7 for families at Sycamore Grove Park. There were 45 attendees that spent some time outdoors decorating wood cookies made downed branches at the park.
- The **30**th **Annual Great Yule Log Hunt** led by Interpreter Eric occurred on 12/14, during one of the stormiest days so far this rainy season. This free program, which always has full registration, unfortunately had less than normal attendance due to the weather. There were 10 diehard yule log attendees that still made it out!



• The 4th Annual Ho Ho Holiday Carnival occurred 12/21 at the ranger station picnic area, featuring fun Midway games, arts & crafts, and holiday treats, with 50+ attendees. This program could not happen without the collective work of staff and support from other departments leading up to the event, and the volunteers who helped set up and run games/stations on the day of the event. Ranger Seth, who leads the event, says "Thank you everyone who put effort into this carnival this year. You all rock."



• Ranger Jay led a **free Wreath Making program** 12/22 with great attendance: 62 attendees. Participants got to construct their own willow wreath and decorate it with natural materials found in the park, highlighting native plant species and seasonal changes.



- While most school and youth programs wind down during this time of year, Interpreters Eric and Christine led a one-of-a-kind field trip during the last week of the fall semester: **Nature Nearby at Garaventa Wetlands for Altamont Creek Elementary School**. Three 4th grade classes learned about the unique alkaline wetland, the wildlife that lives here, and the geology and history that created this special ecosystem. This is our 3rd year offering this walking field trip for Altamont Creek and it is currently the only program where members of the public can access and learn about the wetlands firsthand.
- Interpreters Christine and Eric highlighted the Destination Shelly program at the December LARPD Foundation Board Meeting. They spoke about how the inaugural camp went this past summer, plans for the program in summer 2025, and ways that the Foundation could support this and similar camping programs.
- Park Updates/Natural Resource Management: Staff held the Parking Pass Pre-Sale from November 30th to December 1st. Since parking passes went on sale, nearly 700 have been sold.
- Patterson Ranch Trail is officially open, as of 12/15. We anticipate a more formal acknowledgment of the opening, and the work volunteers did in establishing the trail in the near future. Some of the first hikers on the trail included Junior Rangers on 12/16 led by Ranger Danny and Naturalist Candace!
- Staff have been working to tighten up our **systems for picnic area rentals and photo permits**. While this project is ongoing, we'd like to acknowledge the hard work our office assistant Crystal has been putting in, and the collaboration she's done with other departments.
- Interpreters Eric and Christine led groups throughout Sycamore Grove Park and the newly
 opened Patterson Ranch Trail for this year's Christmas Bird Count. While the dense fog led to
 fewer sightings than in years past, over 40 species of birds were counted and submitted to
 <u>Cornell Lab eBird database</u>. This is the first year that Patterson Ranch Trail has been able to be
 included in the survey area of Eastern Alameda County.





 Volunteers: Thank you to our volunteers who helped with our many interpretive programs in December, including Yule Log & Holiday Carnival. Volunteers also came out for the Open Space Volunteer Day to take native sycamore cuttings for restoration projects and the Native Garden Work Day to help put new plants into the ground and planter boxes at the Wetmore Native Garden. Planter boxes have been the work of several scouts working on their Eagle Projects. It is nice to finally this project come together in the garden.



• Staff Updates & Development: In lieu of a December staff meeting, Open Space held a Staff Breakfast & Birdwalk on 12/11, with the invitation being extended to others at LARPD outside of the department. We made use of the binoculars purchased by the LARPD Foundation, talked about the basics of birding and some of our more easily seen (or heard) local bird species, and enjoyed a cold but beautiful fall morning in the park.

Upcoming: In January, Open Space will hit the ground running with the return of our youth programs Junior Rangers and Sycamore Science Camp. Ranger Programs will include several guided hikes, two programs highlighting native birds, and nature journaling. Planning for summer programs will begin in earnest in January. Staff will be attending some Family Science Nights for local elementary schools. At the parks, we anticipate continued maintenance due to winter weather, including removing downed branches and trees and monitoring and maintaining trails. This time of year, is also good for sycamore propagation and native seed casting, which Natural Resource Technician, Justin and Interpreter Eric will continue to spearhead.

PARKS, FACILITIES, & MAINTENANCE

Parks Department Update: This month, we focused on several key maintenance tasks across various parks and facilities. Pre-emergent herbicides were applied to all parks and trails to control weed growth. At Ernie Rodriguez Baseball, we completed sod planting and infield maintenance, while similar work was done at Max Baer Baseball fields (2), including sod cutting and infield upkeep. We also replaced valves at Robertson Sports (3) to ensure proper irrigation. Additionally, responsibility for ESS and Preschool Maintenance was successfully transitioned and integrated into the regular maintenance schedule. The team conducted a thorough leaf cleanup across all parks and trails and installed waddles for erosion control. These efforts contributed to keeping our facilities in top condition throughout the month.

Facilities Department Update:

• The Holidays are here, and the maintenance team is doing their part to make spirits bright. Whether it's retrofitting an equipment trailer for the Holiday parade or making decorations and setting up for the District Holiday party, the team stepped up to help.



• Unwanted furry visitors to our parks are a constant problem. In recent years we have used several methods to control gophers, ground squirrels, and moles. One of the more successful methods,

and by far the most natural, is the use of owls to control pest populations. In recent months, Technician Mike Loder has built and installed 4 new owl boxes. This round the recipient was Vista Meadows Park.

- At the end of November, work began on resurfacing the gym floor at the Robert Livermore Community Center. The entire floor was sanded and restriped for basketball, volleyball, and pickleball. Completed this month, the results are amazing, and the court floor is new again.
- Many of the wooden monument signs in our parks show signs of age and deterioration. Technician Ryan Voissem took up the challenge of refurbishing the old park signs, making them like new again. Over the last year he's completed more than a dozen. This month's project was for Vista Meadows Park.
